November was a busy month in the Dashkova Centre, our programme highlights featuring new instalments of the Dashkova research seminars, the hosting of three visiting research fellows and The Second Russian Film Festival in Scotland.

The Dashkova Research Seminars

On 7 November the Dashkova seminar speaker was Dr Andy Byford, Senior Lecturer in the School of Modern Languages and Cultures at Durham University. The talk was entitled 'Child Science in Late Imperial and Early Soviet Russia, 1881-1936' and explored children as objects of scientific study, professional expertise and public interest.

ASEEES Convention Awards for members of the Dashkova academic Circle

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On 14 November we were delighted to host Dr Alexander Panchenko, a Leading Research Fellow in the Institute of Russian Literature of the Russian Academy of Sciences (Pushkinskii Dom) and Professor at St Petersburg University. Dr Panchenko gave a talk 'Suggestions, burning, and the chair of wisdom: Symbolic universes of the New Age movements in post-Soviet Russia', in which he expanded on the search for the new spiritual values in contemporary Russia and provoked a lively discussion from various departments of the University, not least Divinity.

The final seminar of the semester was given by Yuri Leving, Professor in Russian and Film Studies at Dalhousie University (Canada). His talk entitled 'The Eye-deology of Trauma: Killing Anna Karenina Softly' discussed various film interpretations of Anna Karenina's suicide in Tolstoy's great novel. We were especially happy to co-host this seminar with the Film Studies department and to have many postgraduate Film Studies students in the audience.

The Second Russian Film Festival in Scotland

From 8 to 15 November the Princess Dashkova Centre held The Second Russian Film Festival in Scotland. The Festival was organised in collaboration with Academia Rossica (London) and funded by CRCEES (Glasgow). We have brought three outstanding award-winning Russian films and two most significant contemporary film directors to meet with the Scottish audience. This year, all Festival events took place at the University of Edinburgh.



'Shame' (Стыд) by Yusup Razykov was screened on 8 November. This powerful film has won a number of prizes in 2013, including FIPRESCI Prize at 48th Karlovy Vary International Film Festival. Set in a decaying military base in the far north of Russia, the film presents a story of the main protagonist Lena, living at an icy remove from the other women of this small and closed community and dealing with her own personal trauma. After the film screening the director Yusup Razykov held a lively discussion and generously shared his views

on the process of film creation, and about the Russian cinema today. Yusup has also kindly given interview for the Dashkova Centre web site.

The second Festival film 'The Geographer Drank His Globe Away' (Географ глобус пропил) (dir. Aleksandr Veledinsky) was also a tremendous success. The film adaptation of Alexei Ivanov's novel was awarded a Grand Prix at the Kinotavr festival, International Jury Best Film Award in Festival and many others. Unfortunately, because of the very busy work schedule Alexander Veledinsky could not attend the screening in Edinburgh, but the University cinema hall was full.

The final event of the Festival was the evening with the acclaimed director Vitaly Mansky and the screening of his latest documentary 'Pipeline' (Tpy6a). The film follows the course of the Trans-Siberian gas pipeline through Russia and into Europe. As the film crew travels the length of the pipeline, the viewer can observe the everyday life of ordinary people living in the towns and villages through which the pipeline goes. Among the questions, director Mansky talked about the hidden senses in his oeuvre as well the state of the Russian film industry and the future of documentary film. On 27th November the Edinburgh University Centre for Cultural Relations was launched with a lecture by Martin Davidson, Chief Executive of the British Council. This interdisciplinary Centre is the first of its kind in the world. It has been established to meet a global need to better understand the expanding range of exchanges between societies. Staff of the Dashkova Centre are excited about this development and look forward to the future collaboration with the new Centre for Cultural Relations.



The 28th of November the University of Edinburgh hosted the Russian Ambassador to Great Britain Dr Alexander Yakovenko. In the Old College the Ambassador gave a Montague Burton Lecture 'Russia's View of the World and Foreign Policy' and answered questions on the international relations.
